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## **THINKING SPRING? WE ARE**



It may not look very springy, but these ugly months are a great time to finalize plans for the spring season, now just a few weeks away. It all starts with

the seed, and I always keep some of my best hybrids and varieties—the ones that will perform well just about anywhere—on the floor for those later purchases and last-minute changes in plans. A heads-up is always nice, however, if you think you'll be needing some.

We still carry Mustang® and Wensman®, and this year we've added Legend®. If you just need a few units, we'll split bags for you. Of course, we have bulk beans and seed treatment available.

We're stressing the importance of getting a pre down again this spring, especially with the resistant weeds we're seeing. In beans, we've seen excellent results with Authority® Assist. This particular product doesn't need much rain to activate. A good pre, combined with getting your postapplication on when the weeds are small, are the two keys to successful control.

> One key to clean beans will be the application of a pre herbicide this spring.

I want to mention one thing to watch for this coming year if you plant Xtend® beans. They tend to be a bushier plant, which favors white mold development. Since white mold tends to attack the flowers, we like to get out there with a fungicide at the R1 stage. There are a number of fungicide options available, and I would be happy to discuss them with you.

If you need another set of eyes on your crops this growing season, that's my favorite part of the job. If you bought your seed here, I try to get out and keep track of

those fields free of charge.

Finally, don't forget our custom application services for fertilizer and crop protection products. We do have a VRT machine, which is a great way to go on rolling terrain with variable soil types. You'll be able to match fertilizer levels with soil productivity.

We also have a couple of pull-type applicators available for rent. And, if you're not quite ready to dive into variable rate but want to know where your fertility levels are, we do offer composite soil sampling.
