Your Cow/Calf Headquarters

Wherever you are in the calving process — just getting started, right in the middle or wrapping up — we have everything you need to get calves off to a good start and cows ready to rebreed.

High-quality calving and breeding minerals are must-haves. The impact of a good mineral program on cow and calf health has been well documented. I know margins are tight, but it's important to maintain minerals uninterrupted through the calving and rebreeding cycle to get the best breeding results and bottom-line benefit. Both Purina® and Kent® have excellent breeding minerals formulated for our part of the country.

We have plenty of colostrum and milk replacer on hand. If you have calf huts, we have tubs to help with baby calves at both our Colton and Hartford locations.

Starting calves on creep feed is right around the corner for many of you. We sell a lot of our own calf starter creeps, available in bag or bulk at both locations. We can also add all-natural products to our starters to help with cocci, e-coli and salmonella.

Fly control was tough last year due to pasture conditions. We're ready for this season, with a variety of options including an additive for creep feed. It seems likely we'll have some pretty heavy early grass this spring, so don't forget your hi-mag tubs for grass tetany.

I want to mention that cattle isn't all we do. We mix a lot of lamb creep right in our mill for maximum cost effectiveness. Like our calf creep, it's available in bag and bulk.



Watch for worms

We're seeing worm infestations in cattle at a much higher rate than normal in recent months. This may be due to the wet conditions last fall. With the softer pasture conditions, it's possible cattle pulled up grass roots and all —and roots are where the worms hang out. Hay baled at higher moisture levels also provides a favorable environment for worms.

Why is the problem so persistent? Some of the injectable and pour-on products can only take care of so many worms, and it's possible the cattle took on such a load of the parasites this summer that some escaped treatment.

If you're seeing worms, we recommend Safe-Guard Cattle 0.5%. This product goes right in the feed, and adding it over the course of a couple of days will take care of the worm problem. One pound of Safe-Guard treats 1,000 pounds of bodyweight, and it's safe to use even when cows are pregnant. You'll clean up your cattle for \$3.50-\$4 per cow — and you'll get that investment back in a hurry in improved animal performance.
